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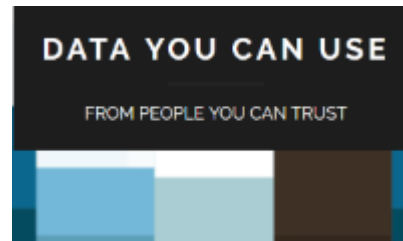

Pilot Goal

Strengthen communication between food pantries, food banks and primary care clinics to increase food security and health of CYSHCN

Objective 1: Assist with relationship-building between food pantries, food banks and clinic staff members, with emphasis on understanding one another's priorities, areas of focus in working with CYSHCN and their families, and opportunities for improvement

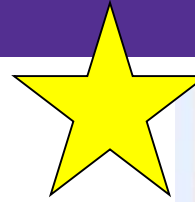
Objective 2: Develop and/or support a system of bidirectional referrals and information sharing between food pantries, food banks and medical homes by building capacity
