The Reach Out and Read difference

Two key aspects of Reach Out and Read set us apart from every other early literacy promotion program.

- We aim to directly influence the parent-child relationship, promoting strong, nurturing, responsive interactions - through the act of sharing books together.
- We leverage the trust parents have in their child's health care provider, using the regular checkup to provide near universal touch points - to support parents as their child's first and best teacher.

The need continues

More than half of all Wisconsin children younger than age 6 are living in low-income families. Children living in poverty face the greatest challenges in entering kindergarten with the skills they need for lifelong success.

Books build better brains

From birth, babies are listening, looking and learning. When adults respond positively, infants and toddlers become interested in the world, explore and learn from it. Reading aloud together provides a way for parents to learn how to engage with their youngest children and create conversational moments that will drive brain and language development. Sharing books together strengthens relationships, creates a love of learning and sets children on a path to reach their full potential.

Reach Out and Read Wisconsin is our state's affiliate supporting the national, evidence-based program. Parents involved with Reach Out and Read are 2.5 times more likely to make shared reading time a family routine and children's preschool language development is improved by three to six months.

Reach Out and Read Wisconsin gives young children a foundation for success by incorporating books into pediatric care and encouraging families to read aloud together.


Our goal

- Raise funds to assist clinics with their book purchases and support our network growth capacity.
- Develop strategic alliances to highlight the importance of investing in our state's youngest children today so they can grow to be our future workforce and leaders of tomorrow.





Reach Out and Read Wisconsin 2018 highlights

Twenty clinics launched Reach Out and Read programs. These clinics will engage parents actively in their child's development and give books to an estimated 8,800 additional children.

Reach Out and Read is a standard of care in nine health systems in Wisconsin: Access Community Health Centers, Group Health Cooperative of South Central Wisconsin, Milwaukee Health Services, NorthLakes Community Clinic, Progressive Community Health Centers, Sixteenth Street Community Health Centers, Vernon Memorial Healthcare, UW Health and Watertown Regional Medical Center. Three more health systems have committed to implementing Reach Out and Read in all of their clinics.

Reach Out and Read Wisconsin Medical Director, Dipesh Navsaria, MPH, MSLIS, MD, spoke at more than 20 state conferences, in-service trainings, public libraries and book festivals, sharing the message that books build better brains and the importance of supporting parents as their children's first and best teachers.
